
November wine tasting: this month we tasted 2 Chardonnays, one from France the other from Australia.

Thursday 6th June Sandringham House and Hunstanton.


Thursday 4th July Donnington le Heath Manor House and King Richard III visitor centre, Leicester

Bookmarks Again: Wild Fire by Ann Cleeves

Many of us have watched episodes of Vera and Shetland on Television and these programmes are based on the talented detective novels of Ann Cleeves. The author manages to evoke the wild, bare landscape of

the Shetland Islands in her writing of Wild Fire and the life of a small town and very rural community. The book Group mentioned how the complex character and foibles of the personalities were explored in the writing. What appeared to be a well thought of Middle-class family seemed to have little time for their children. A family with an autistic son, new to the island were regarded as outsiders. The detective Perez has his own family problems and work obsession to deal with. The long memories of the islanders and their gossip reminds us of the rumours that can flourish even before the time of social media. As in all detective novels there are "Red Herrings" to tempt the reader and draw them in.



EDITORIAL

A GREAT SEA STORY

The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia. The navigator had just finished working out a star fix and brought Captain John DS. Phillips, the result. The Warrimoo's position was LAT 0° 31' N and LONG 179 30' W. The date was 31 December 1899. "Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke in, "We're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line." Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime.

He called his navigators to the bridge to check and double check the ship's position. He changed course slightly to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed.

The calm weather and clear night worked in his favour. At midnight the SS Warrimoo lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line! The consequences of this bizarre position were many:

The ship's bow was in the Southern Hemisphere and in the middle of summer.

The stern was in the Northern Hemisphere and in the middle of winter.

The date in the aft part of the ship was 31 December 1899.

In the bow part, it was 1 January 1900.

This ship was, therefore not only in:

Two different days,

Two different months,

Two different years,

Two different seasons.

HERE ARE A FEW TIPS YOU MIGHT LIKE IN ADVANCE OF CHRISTMAS DAY:

Halve clementines, lemons or limes and pan-fry cut sides in oil until lightly charred, then use to dress roasts.

Shape uncooked stuffing into balls and freeze (open) then transfer to a freezer bag. Defrost overnight and bake while the turkey rests.

Peel whole shallots and roast for 30 minutes until tender. Serve tucked into pigs in blankets or stuffing balls.

Peel carrots, potatoes and parsnips in advance and store overnight in water in the fridge,

Make lemon and herb butter by zesting 2 lemons and combining the zest with 200g salted softened butter and chopped thyme and rosemary. Put into airtight containers and keep in the fridge until needed.

For a more flavourful turkey, stuff the interior with 2 lemons cut into quarters, some herb stalks and 4 onion quarters before roasting.

DELICIOUS VEGAN GRAVY TO MAKE IN ADVANCE OF THE DAY

Ingredients:

- 2 Onions
- 2 Carrots
- 2 Sticks Celery

25g Dried Porcini Mushrooms (or Fresh If Preferred)

Olive Oil

- 2 Sprigs of Fresh Thyme
- 2 tbsps Port/Marsala Wine
- 2 tbsps Blackcurrant, Bramble (Blackberry) or Cranberry Jam
- 2 tbsps Plain Flour
- 2 tsps Marmite
- 1 tbsp Tomato Purée
- 2 tbsps Red Wine Vinegar
- 1½ litres Organic Vegetable Stock

Method

Peel the onions, wash the carrots, then roughly chop them with the celery and porcini. Place pan on a medium heat with a little oil and all the vegetables and herbs. Fry for 25 minutes until turning golden, stirring occasionally. Add the port/marsala and jam, and cook for a further 5 minutes, or until sticky and caramelised. Stir in flour, then Marmite, tomato purée and red wine vinegar. Add stock and boil. Simmer until thickened and reduced until you are happy with the consistency. Pour it through a coarse sieve into a large bowl, using the back of a spoon to extract all the lovely juices. Taste and season, cool to room temperature, then freeze, ready to finish off on Christmas Day. On the day, if frozen, take it out to defrost when the main course goes into the oven, then simply heat through in a pan ready to serve.
