

Computer Group:



Bookmarks Again

MIDDLEMARCH by George Eliot

The reading group decided to present themselves the challenge of reading a significant book from English Literature and Middlemarch,

almost 1000 pages long, was chosen. How proud we all were of not only completing the task but being able to explain why we thought it is considered to be such a wonderful piece of English Literature, beautifully written with characters from all classes of society in a small English town in the mid - nineteenth century. An election, a new railway, the cost of education and income as well as problems with the possibility of disease at the hospital make it feel relevant to the present day. The characters in the novel have their thoughts, emotions, and anxiety, then subsequent actions explained with often philosophical insights. Dorothea, Rosemond, Celia, Tertius, Fred, Mary and Will become real and the reader cares about their futures.

Dorothea tries to use her influence and money to help others. Dr Terius Lydgate wishes to develop the hospital. Unfortunate marriages, wills, and rumour present barriers. Past Illegal underhand dealings come to haunt the town banker, Mr. Bulstarade. The novel demands that all the sentences are read carefully as if reading a Hilary Mantel novel. For those with determination this is rewarding to read on so many levels.

I have just seen in the newspaper that a book group in Dublin have spent 28yrs meeting once a month to read 2 pages at a time of James Joyces "Finnegans Wake! Next month we plan to read "Wildfire" by Anne Cleeves and will meet on the 4th of December in the Waitrose Community Room.



30th: Cook a Scottish dish such as kedgeree or haggis for St Andrew's Day

Another thing which could be added to the "could do" list is to make a *Hot Toddy Cocktail* and here is a delicious recipe to help you along: Boozy or not, this hot cocktail looks almost too pretty to drink and is a warming, wintry way to welcome guests or just to enjoy a quiet, dark November night at home.

Ingredients

Serves 4

2 satsumas, peeled & segmented 5cm of fresh ginger root

8 star anise & 1 tsp black peppercorns ½ tsp cloves & ½ tsp juniper berries

4 x 10cm cinnamon sticks

1ltr unsweetened orange juice & 2 tbsp honey

2 shots of whisky or drambuie

For the topping:

2 tbsp unrefined golden sugar & ½ tsp ground cinnamon

To make

- 1 Place all the ingredients (except for the topping ingredients) into a large pan over a medium heat. Bring to a boil, then reduce the heat & simmer gently, while stirring, for 10 mins.
- 2 Meanwhile, mix the topping ingredients in a dish. Slightly dampen the top of each glass with a little water, then dip into the sugar mix.
- 3 Strain the hot spiced orange juice through a sieve into each glass, then add two star anise, a cinnamon stick & a few satsuma segments to each glass to garnish.
- 4 Add half a shot of whisky to each & serve while still warm.

If you prefer a non-alcoholic mocktail just omit the whisky and/or drambuie.


